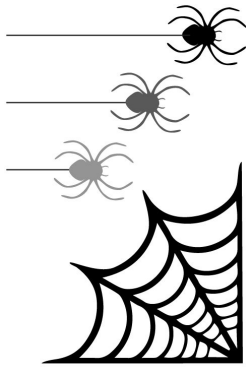

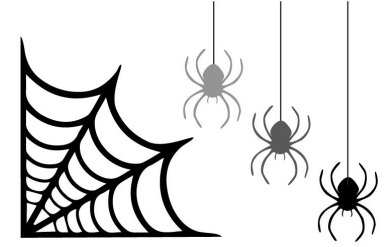

## *From the Pastors Desk*

Dear Friends,

Have you ever noticed how we seem to love whichever season of the year that we are *not* in? I mean, in summer, we complain that it's too hot and in winter, it's too cold. In the spring people say, "Sure it's beautiful watching things bloom, but I like the changing color of the leaves in the fall." We can be fickle people!

I don't normally consider myself to be a 'fall' person, mostly because I don't like cold weather, nor the following time of barren trees. There are even fewer and fewer hours of daylight in the fall! But I do love the changing seasons. They remind me of God's faithfulness throughout life's changes. And, as time passes, I've learned to appreciate that life has many seasons, with peaks and valleys, sun and rain, times of overwhelming, suffocating heat, and periods of bone-chilling cold, yet God presence is genuine in all of these. As the *Hymn of Promise* says, "In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree; in cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free! In the cold and snow of winter, there's a spring that waits to be, unrevealed until it's season, something God alone can see." (*United Methodist Hymnal 707*)

We see God's promises and faithfulness throughout life, and these changing seasons help us to truly appreciate how and where God is at work. For example, we appreciate rain more when the weather has been hot and dry for too long. And we appreciate the heat of summer in the "dead"

of winter. We often see God come into our lives in unexpected ways and turn our own expectations, and the things we thought we liked most, upside down.

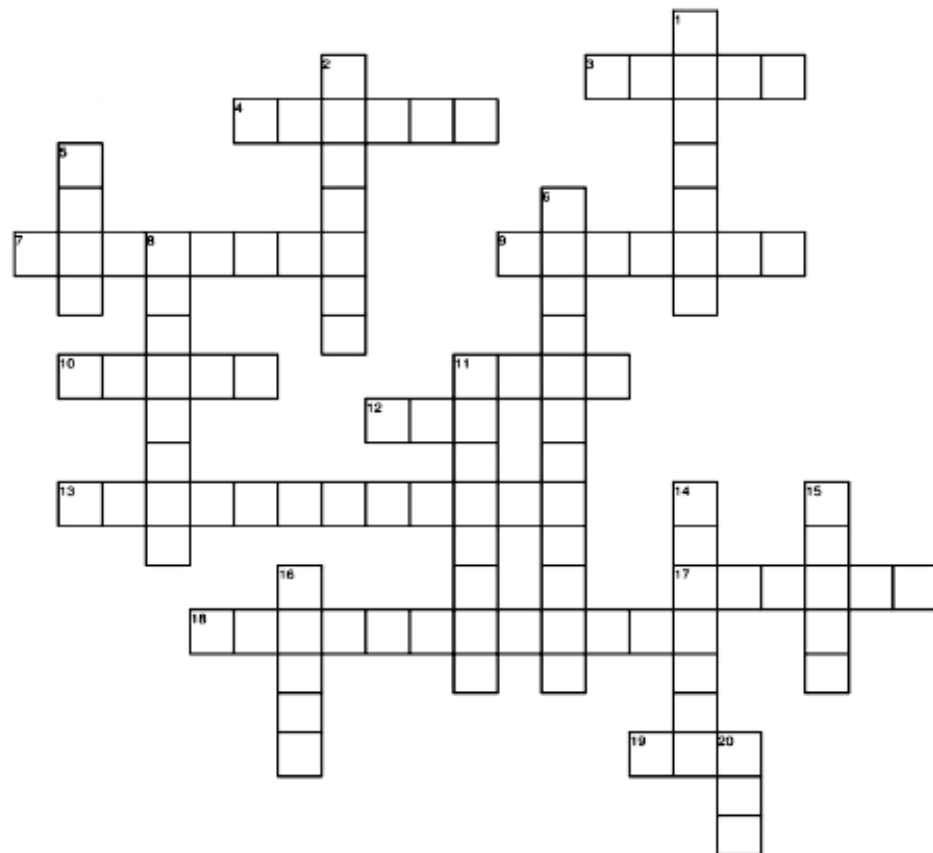
This summer at Faith UMC, we discovered that the ductwork under the sanctuary was substandard and collapsed. Digging through the concrete floor, we actually found the original ductwork was made of heavy cardboard. Needless to say, it had ceased to function and would require major digging and repair. This has forced us to the fellowship hall for Sunday morning worship. Initially, we found the change to be "ok" but kind of awkward. We missed the beauty and majesty of the sanctuary and the sound of the organ. As we have adjusted to the change, we have felt increasingly more comfortable. In fact, I have had people share with me how much they are enjoying seeing each other's faces while we worship and being in closer contact with each other throughout their Sunday morning experience. People talk more and are getting to know each other better! Then this week it happened, someone said to me, "It's hard to imagine going back upstairs and just seeing the back of everyone's heads!" I never thought God could do *that!* Several of my expectations have been turned upside down.

Sometimes, God turns our expectations or even our lives upside down. Generally when this happens, we hate it. We complain. We are uncomfortable. A few of us want to fix it and explain to God how it should be (that's my usual response). Yet, God is so good at turning things upside down and then bringing good out of it all! Jesus did this a lot in Mark's Gospel and in the month of October, our worship will focus around some of those "upside down ways" of Jesus. How has God turned your life upside down in the past? What might God desire to up-end in your life today?

I hope to see you Sunday.

\* We do not need hot dog buns as 600 will be donated from East Balt Bakery.

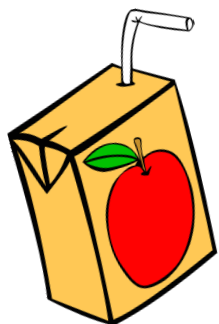
## Head Start/Blessing Bags
